

Sport Premium expenditure

Sport Premium 2020/2021 – Total Sport Premium Funding £18,520 (spent £13,400) a carry forward is permitted and must be spent by 31st July 2022

Our identified area of expenditure is with Moki - the world's first activity tracking wristband and software platform designed specifically for use in schools. It is an exciting new way for schools to engage students and staff as well as support a truly active curriculum. We expect the cost for this engaging activity tracking system to come in at £5000 to £6000 for the whole school. Covid-19 permitting we also hope to include (with the OJSA) another Royal Marine Commando activity couple of days at a cost of approximately £2000

Total number of pupils on role = 252

The Government is providing funding of £150 million per annum to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and will see money going directly to primary school Headteacher's to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children. The funding equates to £16000 per primary school plus £10.00 per pupil on roll, which in our case means we expect to receive approx £18000 in total per year. We have in effect spent more than this.

Purpose of the funding

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer.

This means that we can use the premium to:

- develop or add to the PE and sport activities that your school already offers
- make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

For example, funding can be used to:

- hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers
- provide existing staff with training or resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport
- support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and Change4Life clubs
- run sport competitions
- increase pupils' participation in the School Games
- run sports activities with other schools
